



**Phi Chi Theta
Ambassador Program
Adopted by the Executive Council on July 11, 2014**

This program will provide another opportunity for alumni to be involved with the national organization without being a national officer or committee person.

Ambassadors are volunteers who serve to promote Phi Chi Theta through their day to day business activities.

Ambassadors commit to building strong relationships with schools in their community and advocate for membership in Phi Chi Theta. All referrals for new potential chapters will be referred to the National Vice President of Expansion.

Ambassadors may be called upon by the National Office to represent the National Office at local collegiate or alumni event. They may also be asked to assist the National Office in dealing with a local chapter issue. Finally, an ambassador may be asked to serve on a national project.

Ambassadors will receive a briefing bi-annually from the National President on information pertinent to their service.

All alumni members in good standing per the National Bylaws and Standing rules are eligible to serve as an ambassador. The National President will appoint all ambassadors. Appointments will expire at the end of the biennium in which they were executed. Ambassadors may reapply each biennium. An ambassador can be removed for cause with a majority vote of the National Executive Council.

Ambassadors are to comply with all of the National Bylaws, Standing Rules, and National Policies when serving in this capacity. In particular, ambassadors are not elected officers of Phi Chi Theta and cannot speak on behalf of Phi Chi Theta or obligate Phi Chi Theta legally or financially.

The role of ambassador is a volunteer role. Ambassadors will cover all of their own expenses.

All ambassadors are entitled to one Ambassador Certificate and pin when they accept their appointment as an ambassador.

The National President or his/her designee will coordinate the activities of the Ambassadors.

This policy supersedes any previous documents published on this issue. This policy does not however supersede any provisions in the Phi Chi Theta National Bylaws.
