each year we publish this special edition of eEdNews. In this issue, we’ll share answers to some of

the most frequently asked questions about the scholarship program and the application process. You’ll also gain some insight, from past Evaluators, on what they look for when reviewing and evaluating the scholarship applications. We also recognize and honor our past scholarship recipients and look towards August when we will continue the proud tradition of recognizing the scholastic achievement and commitment to the Phi Chi Theta ideals in our members.

## Scholarship FAQs

Over the years, aspiring scholarship applicants have asked some really good questions about the Scholarship Program, eligibility and application requirements, and insight into the expectations of a scholarship recipient. As you begin the scholarship application process, we have compiled a list of some of these frequently asked questions to share with you.

**Q: How many scholarships will be awarded this year?**

**A:** This summer, the Phi Chi Theta Scholarship Program will be awarding six (6) scholarships valued at \$4,500 to members of Phi Chi Theta.

**Q: When is the deadline for filing an application?**

**A:** Application and required forwarded materials must be postmarked **NO LATER THAN May 1**.

**Q: When will the scholarships be awarded, and how will I know if I am a recipient?**

**A:** The scholarship recipients will be announced in August at the Phi Chi Theta National Chapter Meeting (August 11-14) in Orlando, FL.

**Q: Who is eligible to apply for a scholarship?**

**A:** All members of Phi Chi Theta in good standing are eligible to apply for the scholarships. To qualify for consideration, applicant must be:

- A national member of Phi Chi Theta in good standing. A member in good standing is an active dues' paying member (collegiate or alum) or Life Member of the organization.
- A student who has completed at least one semester or two quarters of college in the United States.

- A student who will be enrolled in and attending classes during the forthcoming academic year at an approved college or university in the United States, in pursuit of a degree (bachelor's, master's, or doctoral) in the fields of Business and/or Economics.

**Q: I am pursuing a MBA at a University that doesn't have a PCT chapter. Can I still apply for a scholarship?**

**A:** Yes. Assuming you meet the qualifications stated above then you can apply.

**Q: I will be returning to school part-time (not taking a full course load) and working fulltime. Can I still apply for a scholarship?**

**A:** Yes. Assuming you meet the qualifications stated above then you can apply.

**Q: In the Fall, I will be doing a studies' abroad program through the University where I am enrolled at. Can I still apply for a scholarship?**

**A:** Yes. Assuming you meet the qualifications stated above then you can apply.

**Q: I want to pursue a business-related professional certification (i.e., PMP, MSCE, CISSP, Six Sigma). Can I apply for a scholarship that can be put towards training for the certification?**

**A:** No. At this time the Phi Chi Theta Scholarship Program does not include training for business-related professional certifications as an eligibility requirement. The Foundation and Fraternity are researching the possibility of including a certification scholarship program for alumni. There will be more news about this program in 2011, after a planning and fundraising campaign.

**Q: When should I start filling out the application?**

**A:** As past scholarship recipients will attest to, the sooner you start the application process the better off you will be. It is recommended to start **NO LATER THAN March 1.**

In August 2009, the Foundation recognized and awarded \$4,000 worth of scholarships to members that exemplify the qualities of leadership, scholastic achievement and commitment to Phi Chi Theta. Here are some tips and advice from them on completing the scholarship application:



**Melissa (Missy) Bolin (Gamma Iota), 2009 Naomi L. Satterfield Memorial Scholarship** – "From my experience, as an applicant, my hints for the application process are to start early, spell-check everything, make sure you have glowing letters of recommendation and the big lesson is have something important or impressive to the specific organization to put on the application."



**Melissa Hall (Epsilon), 2009 Irene M. Meyer Memorial Scholarship** – "Completing the application was easy, but starting early is the key in order to make sure every part is in place before the deadline. Taking the time to apply for a Phi Chi Theta scholarship is worth the honor and reward!"



**Lindsay Solomon (Alpha Iota), 2009 Trustees' Scholarship in Honor of Phi Chi Theta's 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** – "For my fellow brothers and sisters who are interested in completing the application for the 2010 scholarship, I would first and foremost encourage you to take the initiative to apply. I recommend that you start the process early and take the time to think through your responses to all of the questions. I encourage all of you to be a fully-active member in each of your chapters. The more that you put into this organization, the more you will get out of it. The possibilities are endless."



**Johnny Crane (Zeta Epsilon), 2009 Anna E. Hall Memorial Scholarship** –

“If you do decide that you want to apply for one of the scholarships offered in 2010, I would recommend getting involved with your chapter as much as you can and work hard in the classroom. By doing this, I believe that it will not only increase your chances of receiving a scholarship, it will also make you stand out to potential employers. Once again, I highly recommend to every active member to apply for one of Phi Chi Theta’s various scholarships this coming spring.”



**Lisa Htang (Epsilon Phi), 2009 Helen D. Snow Memorial Scholarship** –

“My advice on completing the scholarship application would be to make sure to apply early! This will help ensure that there will be enough time to collect all the necessary requirements.”

**Q: How do I apply?**

**A:** Please visit our [web site](#) to download the application, obtain specific information about the supplemental material that is part of the completed package, and the criteria for selection.

**Q: Can I apply online?**

**A:** Yes. Send your completed application by e-mail to: [PCTEdScholarship@aol.com](mailto:PCTEdScholarship@aol.com).

**Q: Can I send the official transcript with the scholarship application?**

**A:** No. You must request an official transcript from your Registrar’s Office to be mailed directly to the Chair of the Scholarship Committee.

**Please Note:** Official Transcript **MUST** still be sent, via regular mail (USPS), from the University to the Phi Chi Theta Educational Foundation Scholarship Committee, 1886 South Poplar Street, Denver, CO 80224-2271.

**Q: Can I send the letters of recommendation with my scholarship application?**

**A:** No. The two (2) letters of recommendation must be sent to the Chair of the Scholarship Committee. Faculty member (required) and either a Phi Chi Theta Fraternity officer, or an employer’s letters of recommendation.

**Please Note:** The letters may be sent by e-mail to [PCTEdScholarship@aol.com](mailto:PCTEdScholarship@aol.com) or by regular mail. The letter from faculty member or employer is to be on letterhead.

**Q: How do I know if the Scholarship Chair has received all of the required information?**

**A:** After submitting the application, you may contact the Scholarship Chair at [PCTEdScholarship@aol.com](mailto:PCTEdScholarship@aol.com) to ask if all of the required material has been submitted. Additionally, the Scholarship Chair will be in contact with the applicants to make certain that items have been received in a timely manner. That is one of the reasons why an applicant should start the process March 1. If the application comes in near the May 1 deadline, unfortunately there isn’t time to inform the applicant of the missing piece.

**Q: I’ve been named one of scholarship recipients. What do I get, and when do I get it?**

**A:** First off, congratulations on this scholastic and Phi Chi Theta achievement. A check, made out to the University, in the amount of the scholarship award, along with a framed certificate to proudly display, and a congratulatory letter from the President of the Foundation will be sent to each recipient. The scholarship checks will be mailed in August after the official announcement. The checks should be cashed by the University within 6 months of award.

**Q: I’ve already paid my tuition for the Fall semester. What do I do with the check?**

**A:** If you have already paid your tuition for the Fall 2010 Semester, you have the option of applying the check to the Spring Semester 2011,

or request a refund. Please consult with your University Registrar's Office for specifics on applying the check towards your tuition/fees.

**Q: Now that I've received a scholarship, what kind of commitments and obligations do I have to Phi Chi Theta?**

**A:** As the saying goes, "Once a Phi Chi Theta, Always a Phi Chi Theta." We hope that receiving a scholarship is a proud scholastic and Phi Chi Theta achievement for you. You are a role model to your fellow sisters and brothers in your chapter and at the National level. As a role model, we hope that you will encourage your fellow sisters and brothers to participate in the Phi Chi Theta Scholarship Program. We hope that you will also work with your chapter, alums, and local business community to sponsor a fundraiser and donate the proceeds to the Foundation. This will enable the Foundation to continue providing quality educational programs and scholarship opportunities to the next generation of Phi Chi Theta members.

**Q: I've noticed that past scholarship recipients get profiled in the Foundation's newsletter and other electronic mediums. What are the expectations for all of this media exposure?**

**A:** As a scholarship recipient, you exemplify scholastic achievement, leadership and commitment to the ideals of Phi Chi Theta. We may ask you to share your insight and advice with future applicants in the form of a video testimonial or writing a short article for our newsletter. A brief biographical sketch and photo will be published on our web site. You'll also be included in our future "Interview with a Scholarship Recipient" and "Where Are They Now" segments of [eEdNews](#). We will contact you, provide guidance on the type of content, and a due date for submission. Your participation is purely voluntary. As a role model, we hope that you will want to share your insight and knowledge with other members.

**Q: Shucks, I didn't receive a scholarship this year. Can I receive feedback about my application so that I can try again next year?**

**A:** Yes. The Phi Chi Theta Scholarship Committee is more than happy to provide you with general observations and feedback received about your application from the Evaluators. We cannot provide you with actual scores, rankings, or tell you who provided specific feedback. You may contact the Scholarship Chair after August 15 to schedule a debriefing session.

**Q: Can I apply again next year?**

**A:** Yes. As long as you will be returning to school (undergraduate or graduate) during the next academic year, and you meet the other eligibility requirements stated above, you are qualified to apply.

**Q: I received a scholarship in 2009, can I apply again this year?**

**A:** Yes. As long as you will be returning to school (undergraduate or graduate) during the next academic year, and you meet the other eligibility requirements stated above, you are qualified to apply.

**Q: I still have more questions about the scholarship program or the application process. Who do I contact?**

It's March, and you have started filling out your application. Being the future business leader that you are, you know that if you want to "close the deal" you need to build

a compelling story about yourself, your contribution, and its impact or results – the "Wow Factor." We recently asked former Evaluators to share their insight into what they look for when evaluating each applicants "Wow factor."



**Frances Spencer (Delta)**

One of the things I have looked for in past years on the scholarship applications is whether or not the applicant is well rounded, i.e., has a variety of interests which are balanced with their scholastic credentials. I am not as impressed by their participation in "one time" service opportunities as I am by their on-going efforts to be a better tutor, etc.

**Involvement:** I compare and contrast their time involved in Phi

Chi Theta to their other activities. Where they spend their time and what they do specifically for Phi Chi Theta.

**Course Load:** I don't pay as much attention to their grade point average as I do the courses they take and how many do they take per semester. So to me, they should emphasize their course load and how they manage their time to do Phi Chi Theta work.

**Specificity:** Avoid generalities and be specific on the essay on how and what you gained through your experience in Phi Chi Theta that will help you in the business world.

**Experience:** I look for any part-time/volunteer jobs to gain experience in their field.

**Goal Oriented:** I also look for timeliness or if they have set goals for themselves to achieve in the future. Again Specifics.

#### ***When looking into the applicant's involvement in Phi Chi Theta and the community I look at:***

- Was the applicant just "involved" in PCT, or did the applicant lead an effort (i.e., a committee, plan events, etc)?
- How did the applicant describe their involvement in PCT? Did they mostly attend social events or were they involved in furthering the fraternity, professional growth, membership, or service?
- Was community involvement primarily just through PCT, or is the individual well-rounded in that they are also involved in other community efforts outside of PCT?

#### ***When reading the essay portion of the applications I ask myself:***

- Does the essay answer the question? Is the message clear?
- Is the essay well structured? Do the paragraphs flow?
- Are the main points well supported?
- Is the essay free of grammar and punctuation errors? In other words, has this essay been carefully proof-read?
- Is this essay of the quality of that which should be expected by a college student?
- Has the essay convinced me, or am I skeptical after having read it? Do the points add up? Do I believe that the applicant is being 100% truthful?

#### ***When evaluating the scholastic/academic portion of the application I consider factors such as:***

##### Transcript:

- For the courses that have been taken what is the overall GPA? What is the major GPA? Has the GPA taken into account all courses, or only those at the most recent school?
- What is the grading scale that the GPA is based on? Is it a 5.0, 4.0, other? Are only A, B, C counted or +/- grades counted?
- What grades have been achieved in "easier" core classes (100-200 level)? What grades have been achieved in "harder" classes or specific major classes (300-400 level)?
- Does the applicant specifically mention working long hours that may affect their grades?
- Has the applicant re-taken any courses that they previously performed poorly in?
- Is the reported GPA representative of that of which is on the transcript?

##### Resume:

- Is this a resume of that I would consider of someone working for my company?
- Is the resume complete? Is the resume well made, or quickly thrown together?
- Does the resume reflect the transcript, or are the two in conflict?
- Is everything neat, spelled correctly?

I am very interested in how the essay flows and its content. I also look at the number and type of courses the student is taking. I am always aware that I will not see many business classes in the freshman and sophomore years. However, since I worked in a College of Business, I am aware of the courses required in those years.

Letters of Recommendation sent at the last minute are not always as impressive as those sent early in the application process. There is a special sheet to give to the person making the recommendation. It is always positive if I know that the person writing the recommendation has received that sheet. It can also take up to two weeks for a transcript sent from the University to the committee, so you do not want to leave that for the last-minute either.

I was highly encouraged not only at the number of applications from the somewhat small number of chapters that I was responsible for, but even more so the numerous accomplishments and contributions which my fellow brothers and sisters had made to their respective chapters, schools, and communities. I reviewed and evaluated each of the applications based upon key criteria and guidance provided to the scholarship committee by Mary Ellen. At the completion of my evaluation I submitted the scores, and recommendation for award which, when combined with the other evaluator's score, contributed to the final determination of the Phi Chi Theta members who would become the recipients of the 2009 scholarships.

All in all, I am honored to have had a hand in serving as an Evaluator on the Phi Chi Theta Scholarship Committee, and look forward to serving Phi Chi Theta again in the future.

## Donating Made Easy Customer Loyalty Cards

All of us have at least one of those "customer loyalty" cards or key tabs from a retailer, i.e., grocery, book store, drug.
